PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Members,

The Club takes this wonderful opportunity in wishing our new King, His Majesty Sultan Mohammad V, heartfelt congratulations on His Majesty's ascension to the throne. His Majesty's reign of tenure will be until 2022, a period of 5 years. MENJUNJUNG KASIH, TUANKU. DAULAT TUANKU!

The Finance Department is currently working towards addressing the accounting and administrative issues highlighted by our external auditors. Our bank reconciliation statements are now up to-date, save for ongoing inquiries to resolve the uncredited lodgements which would require further information and assistance from certain members. We would like to urge all members to review their respective monthly statements of account and contact us if there are any discrepancies noted. As part of our initiative to resolve the accounting issues, the Membership Department and the Finance Department are working together to reconcile the members' deposits.

The Finance Department has also planned to undertake an exercise to tag the Club's fixed assets (plant and equipment) in order to safeguard these assets and to minimise the risk of pilferage or damage to these assets. We are also working towards updating the Club's financial statements and our main objective is to ensure that all items carried on the statement of financial position (as at the Club's financial year-end of 30 June 2017) are supported with auditable evidence. Discussions with external auditors are under way in preparation for the upcoming audit of the year-end financial statements. With the support from members and staff, we will work relentlessly towards obtaining an unqualified audit opinion on our financial statements.

The budget for 2017/2018 ("Budget") has been prepared in line with the principles of financial prudence and cost efficiency, and with the objective of reducing the monthly operating loss of the Club. The Budget will be tabled to the General Committee in May 2017 for review, revision (if necessary) and approval. The Budget also incorporates the expected increases in revenue in terms of subscription, F&B and Machine Room earnings. The budget will be presented to members at the next Annual General Meeting to be convened in November/December 2017. "

The F&B initiatives for Pavilion, Garden Café, Poolside Café, Bunga Raya and Buttery are bearing fruit by way of increase in patronage. The Breakfast Menu at Pavilion is a hit with Members, especially during weekends. The serving of Malay kuihs and the ever-popular nasi lemak Tanglin at Garden Café have brought in more crowd. There will be more new choices at Poolside stalls in the coming months and The Orchid should see some revision in menu.

The E&E (Event & Entertainment) programme started off with a big bang, with The Kumar Show on April 7 at the Banquet Hall. It brought in nearly 400 Members and guests. There is currently a waiting list of some 200, hoping that E&E will bring back the same show in the latter part of this year.

Coming next is Alleycats Concert, slated for Saturday, May 20. To date, the attendance list stands at 325 and this looks set to be another packed and enjoyable evening. There will be at least one more comedy show, not to mention other interesting events, planned for later this year.

The holy month of Ramadhan will be upon us come May 27 and this also means the



commencement of 'Buka Puasa' or 'Iftar' at Banquet Hall. This year, E&E has worked out a good deal with Felda D'Saji, with only the best in mind for Members. Promotional banners are already out, so make sure you make your bookings early.

The Library Talk entitled "The Resurgence of the Right" on Saturday April 22 too was well attended, by some 50 people. This was unprecedented, considering such talks usually would attract 20 or so members. The talk was presented by Tommy Thomas, a renowned lawyer and 'social scientist'. The Library Sub-Committee intends to bring in more presenters with equally interesting topics later this year.

As always, the Staff Party & Family Day was held on April 30-May 1 and this year's venue was Bayou Lagoon Park Resort in Melaka. This annual outing has always been an event of great anticipation, thus it was heartening to see Club staff and their family members enjoying themselves thoroughly at the Resort. This year's party theme was "Walk through the Decades." There were many lucky draw prizes given out to the delight of staff. Several GC members also attended the Party.

On the home front, as H&G (House and Grounds) carry out their maintenance work around the Club, we continue to see more Members returning to enjoy its facilities, social events, camaraderie and of course the good food served at the 7 main outlets.

Even our newsletter too has been refreshed to give a new dimension to news and information about the Club and its Members. A page has also been apportioned to staff events to recognise the importance of our staff to the Club.

Lastly, I take this opportunity in wishing all Members a happy Mother's Day, Father's Day and Wesak Day, and last but not least, Selamat Menyambut Bulan Ramadhan Al-Mubarak.

MEMBERSHIP APPLICATION FROM CHILDREN OF MEMBERS

In keeping with the Constitution, the Club shall only accept membership applications from Children of Members subject to the following:

- a) Application for Lady Membership at the preferential rate of entrance fee of RM2,000 shall be strictly for female children between the ages of 18 and 21 years old. There shall be no other restrictions except that the Parent Member must have completed 5 years of voting membership before the child reaches 21 years old.
- b) The application for Voting Membership at the preferential rate of entrance fee of RM7,500 shall be opened to Members' children of both gender, above the age of 18, subject to payment of all debts and other liabilities to the Club to be incurred by them prior to attaining the age of twenty-one years is guaranteed to the satisfaction of the General Committee. As there are no other eligibility provisions relating to application for Voting Membership by children of members, the following shall apply:
 - (i) The Parent Member must have completed 5 years of voting membership before the child applicant reaches 21 years old.
 - (ii) Applications must be submitted before the child applicant reaches his/her 25th birthday or 6 months from the date of his/her return from overseas or 6 months from the date of graduation, whichever is the earlier.

All earlier provisions are hereby repealed.







He was of the view that globalisation, rising unemployment,


immigration and an overall sense of helplessness of the man on the street was driving the masses to support the right. The big question is whether this phenomenon is a short-or long-term trend.


The Library Talk was well-received by members who attended the event and felt that more of such programmes be held.
















ANNUAL STAFF DINNER

The ambience notwithstanding, it is definitely the food that is doing the trick in popularising the Garden Cafe. Few nasi lemak, in my humble opinion, beat Tanglin's which has been warming our hearts (and stomachs) for years. General Manager, SuhailiAzman Johari and I swung by the other day to renew our gastronomical ties with the place.

We saw satisfied smiles on the faces of patrons, regardless of age. For one, it has a little something for everyone, whatever the time of day, Tanglin Nasi Lemak can be had for breakfast or lunch with half-boiled eggs and a cup of fresh-brewed coffee (Arabica Robusta, no less). There is also toast, butter and jam with coffee or tea of choice for that "Englishy" feeling.

Azman told me efforts are underway to enhance the nasi lemak selection with the addition of meat or squid. We wish him well as he and outlet supervisor Sakila Che Pa try to get us the best for our money. As to the kueh mueh that have graced the shelves of late, the initial excitement has arguably died down due to teething problems. Azman hopes to put the kueh mueh idea back on the tracks soon. There is an assortment of murukku in a corner that will go very well with a teh tarik anytime. I would be remiss in my duties if I did not mention, among others, the pizza, sandwiches, pies and spaghetti that I hope to try soon.

The eye-catching cakes in the refrigerated compartment have won over many a member.

(There is a 20 per cent discount on cakes between 7.30pm and 9pm daily). Azman, an ex-hotelier who always has an eye on the bottomline, says the eatery is very much in the pink. "We are doing well and expect to do better in time to come," he says in understatement given the Garden Cafe's popularity. One can spend all day at the cafe but a word of caution: no formal meetings or use of mobile phones. On a personal note, I am most happy that the newspapers are back at the rack, after a brief absence. They somehow lend something extra to the eating experience in the garden.

One day, Tun Hussein turned at the barber shop but found it locked. There was no one inside. He seek out then General Manager, Hakimi, and was told that Kunjuraman had been hospitalized with a mild heart attack. On my part, as a loyal patron of Kunjuraman, I felt it was only right to drop by on him, so off I went to the General Hospital, accompanied by Hakimi and our then F&B manager Kamaralzaman. The barber was in his element, laughing merrily and making friends with everyone.

He seemed relieved to see us and inquired if Tun Hussein had been informed of his set back. We assured him that the needful had been done. Whilst at the ward, we heard police sirens blaring. His most loyal customer, Tun Hussein Onn, had arrived to cheer him up. Tun Hussein's visit had resulted in Kunjuraman being moved from the small and overcrowded ward to the first-class ward.

The following evening I once again visited him. This time he looked terribly sad. When asked why, he replied, "Here I have bigger TV, bigger waiting room, bigger bed, bigger fridge with plenty of food, and cold air-cond. But here I don't have friends." Lamenting that his friends were all in the other ward, he asked to be sent back there. Subsequently, Hakimi made the necessary calls to have him transferred back to third-class ward.

Years went by and with time, I became Club President. In my fifth year as president, the barber came to see me. He said he no more had spring in his step and that he wanted to retire and return to India, to be with his family and to enjoy a long and deserving retirement.

It was sad to let him go. To honour him, we decided to host a farewell tea party. Some 300 people turned up. Our GM, Hakimi, was tasked with garlanding Kunjuraman but when told, the barber said with a wink, "Don't trouble Hakimi as I have already made arrangements for Tun Hussein Onn to come and garland me".



At the appointed time, Tun turned up, had tea and garlanded his "loyal and trusted barber". The barber then asked me for 200 copies of the newsletter to be brought back to India, Boy, was I shocked! "Nobody reads newsletters in the Club — here the barber wanted 200 copies of it!". He later explained "I want to give the newsletters to my relatives and my neighbours and show them the picture and tell them that the Prime Minister himself came and garlanded me on my retirement".

We took him to the airport on the day of his departure. His flight to Madras was also memorable. Captain Azmi Radzi, one of his Club regulars, heard of his retirement and departure to India and made arrangement to himself fly the said MAS aircraft to Madras.


Kunjuraman became a VIP aboard the flight. Captain Azmi, exercising his discretion, upgraded his popular barber to first class (in those days the commandant of the flight had plenty of discretions). Barber having enjoyed the privileges and pleasures of the Club for 30 years, had somehow acquired the taste for the good things in life. He availed himself fully to "Dom Perignon" — the finest of French champagnes. Dom Perignon was standard fare on MAS flights in the early days of the airline.

Clad in neatly pressed and well laundered white tunic with a "Nehru like collar" and with pleasant disposition, he could have easily passed off as the Captain's doctor. Whatever it was barber was at home in his first class environment.

Upon landing in Madras, our over-indulgent barber was seen to be somewhat unsteady. With Captain Azmi's steadying hands, the barber was helped down the aircraft's gangway. He was the last to leave the aircraft. Kunjuraman then proceeded to the airport's immigration centre in the crew's transport vehicle. Barber truly lived like a VIP and returned home a VIP.

Captain Azmi on his return to Kuala Lumpur reported that when he finally bade "sayonara" to his barber at the Madras immigration post, Kunjuraman with tears in his eyes hugged him and said "terima kasih & selamat jalan". Our barber went back and never returned.

Kunjuraman was a colourful and loveable man...a legend in his own right....

Club "De-Registration" : An Update

The above article was published in our newsletter Jan / Feb 2017 edition.

It was held out in paragraphs 2 & 3 of the said Article that "the information stated therein was made available to Mr Mahinder Singh by Dr Molly Cheah Bee Li in confidence and in breach of the said confidence Mr Mahinder Singh had relayed it to Mr Radhakrishnan".

Mr Mahinder Singh takes the position that this is not correct as Dr Molly did not allege this in the Disciplinary Proceedings nor did she say this in her reply to Mr Radhakrishnan's complaint, though she had been telling members in her conversation with them "that confidence was breached". He further says that he has been embarrassed by this article.

The Editorial Committee, in retrospect, takes the position that since Dr Molly did not raise the issue of "breach of confidence" in her official reply and before the Disciplinary Committee that Mr Mahinder Singh has a valid point.

The Editorial Committee takes the further position that it was never its intention to mis-report the facts and that any embarrassment caused to Mr Mahinder Singh is inadvertent.

With regard to Mr Mahinder Singh's complaint against Dr Molly the General Committee takes the position that it is every member's right under the Constitutional Rules of the Club to lodge disciplinary complaints of misconduct against other members.

Mr Mahinder Singh also wants it to be known to the general membership, that when the General Committee through its emissaries went to see the ROS—"he had categorically stated that the information to the ROS must be in the proper perspective and most importantly it must be accurate".



SUDOKU CHALLENGE



Results/Worked Example of Sudoku Challenge: March/April 2017 Issue.

Tetsuya Nisho "Extreme Sudoku" (Vertical, Inc. NY) Adapted No. 19 HARD; 24 clues; 57 digit solutions. Solving process is based on a systematic and structured methodology involving analyzing in the 3 bands and 3 stacks (tools: analysis of R, C, B, using missing digits; techniques: by only-cell (OC) or by only-digit (OD); logic: OC or OD. Where possible, only OD logic used is stated. Sequence of solutions depends on tools and techniques used. The choice of which band or stack to analyse first depends on the situation. For band/stack analysis, we use original digits as missing digits; digit solutions/strategic locked sets of candidates deduced on follow-up strategy are not considered.




Figure 1: Band 1: R2: Due to initial digit 9 in B1, B2, C9, deduce 91, R2C8. 1st F.up 91, C7: Deduce 92, R6C7. 2nd F. up 91, C8: Missing [13478]. Due [147] in R7, [3] in B9, deduce 83, R7C8, OD. 3rd F. up B2: Missing [23456]. Due to [56] in B2, [24] in C6, deduce 34, R2C6, OD. F. up 34, R2: Due to [56] in B2, deduce 1st LS(24), R2/B2. F. up on LS(4), B1: Deduce 2nd LS(4), B1/C2 Stack 1: C3: Deduce 95, R9C3. F. up 95, C3: Due to 7 in B1, R4, R7, deduce 76, R5C3.




Figure 3: Stack 2 (cont'd): F. up 610, B8: Due to 610 in R9, deduce 611, R7C5. F. up 611, R7: Due to 3 In C1, deduce 312, R7C3. F. up 312, R7: By last blank cell, deduce 513, R7C1. F. up 513, R2: Due to 513 in C1, deduce 514, R2C9. R2: Deduce 615, R2C1. F. up, C1: Missing [128]. Due to [18] in R5, deduce 216, R5C1, OD.

From situation analysis, clearly, from the 17th solution to the final 57th solution, the Sudoku is solved directly and easily.

only-cell logic or the only-digit logic is used, a logic that is in line with Sudoku rules. 3. The methodology that I use is called the "Band & Stack

Methodology". Using only original digit clues, initial digit solutions/strategic locked sets of candidates are deduced. Analysis in bands and stacks using the analytical tools are used to classify these initial digit solutions. Every result of initial digit analysis is followed up and such a process produces a chain of solutions.

4. For hard Sudokus, when no blank cell can be deduced to contain a digit as solution, a set of blank cells is deduced to contain specific digit solutions in a row, column or block, otherwise analysis using "what-if" reasoning has to be used. This set of blank cells is called a "locked set of candidates" that are deduced based on Sudoku rules, 4 types are met with in solving hard Sudokus: LS(x), LS(xy), LS(xyz) and LS(wxyz).
