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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Fellow Members,

After more than two weeks of festivities and merry-making to welcome the Chinese New Year of the Wooden Horse, it is time for us to get back to some serious business ensuring smooth operations at the Club.

On 10 February 2014, Mr Johnny Lau, General Manager, tendered his resignation after having been with the Club since 16 October 2010. While we go through the due process in finding and recruiting our next General Manager, your General Committee has in the meantime appointed Senior Food & Beverage Manager, En Suhailiazman

Johari as Acting General Manager. We hope to identify and hire the right candidate for the GM's position as soon as possible.

In the last Issue of Jan Newsletter, I had referred to the 'Qualified Opinion' stated in the Audited Annual Accounts ending 30 June 2013 by our Auditors, Messrs Azman, Wong, Salleh & Co and their basis for the 'Qualified Opinion'. Members at the AGM on 8 December 2013 had taken a vote to give Management three months till March 2014 to investigate and resolve the unreconciled difference of RM718,000. A Special three - member Ad-Hoc Committee was also appointed at the AGM to help the Management and Finance Sub-Committee to investigate and resolve the difference and to report back to the House at a properly convened Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM). In this respect, your General Committee has scheduled an EGM to be held at 10.00 a.m on Sunday, 6 April 2014 at our Club's Banquet Hall . At this meeting, General Committee and Management together with the Special three - member Ad-Hoc Committee, will table a Report for members' information and deliberation.

Following renovations to the Children's Changing Room in 2012 and the Ladies' Changing Room (LCR) in 2013, members have been anxiously enquiring when the Men's Changing Room (MCR) will be renovated/refurbished. Members may be pleased to know that your General Committee has planned to complete renovation works of the MCR before October this year. At the same time, we are also planning to upgrade /refurbish our Club's Main Kitchen by September 2014.

Our Project Implementation Committee (PIC) will be putting up the relevant architectural plans and drawings for the MCR and Main Kitchen at strategic locations for members' viewing and comments. It is hoped that with useful feedback from members, suitable proposals will be made to improve the facilities for members' benefit.

As for the Ladies' Changing Room and Banquet Hall, upgraded and refurbished in 2013, we will be contacting the respective contractors soon to make good all the defects communicated and received through members' feedback, before the end of the Defects & Liability period as provided for in the Contract.

Please do not hesitate to communicate your views and feedback to the Club's GC and Management for improving the ambience at our Club.

Wine & Cheese Party

On the evening of 20th February, Dato' Derrick Chan, the Chairman of the Wine Panel, welcomed the 65 Members and guests who gathered to sample 8 wines provided by Nam Lee Cheong Sdn. Bhd.

The selected 'old world' wines were from France, Italy and Portugal, with 'new world' wine represented from Australia and Chile. Prices ranged from RM47 to RM95 per bottle.

The three whites tabled were: an Italian Tommasi Pinot Grigio Le Rosse, a Domaines Schlumberger Riesling 'Les Princes Abbes' from Alsace, France, and a Chilean Montes Chardonnay.

Athough the buttery Montes Classic Series Chardonnay 2012 was aged in oak for 6 months, it did not seem to be over-oaked.

The Domaines Schlumberger Riesling 'Les Princes Abbes' 2012, is made in the typical German aromatic style. The nose is of lemon, grapefruit, peach, and the citrus side comes through more on the palate.

However, my favourite white wine of the evening was the Italian Tommasi Pinot Grigio Le Rosse, delle Venezie IGT 2012. The first sip had my salivary glands working overtime with it's crisp clean bite. Not too acidic either, but just round and fresh.

So on now to try the 5 red wines. I found the Tommasi Bardolino DOC to be dry, yet fresh, with a hint of almonds and cherry flavours.

The Montes Classic Merlot 2012 needs little introduction. This Chilean winemaker produces a excellent range of wines for every occasion. Dry and fruity, with black pepper hints.

A Moillard Cotes du Rhone 'Les Violettes' 2012 represented France. A blend of Syrah, Grenache, Mourvèdre and Cinsault grapes. I have bought this wine before, but this evening it did not excite me, perhaps because I could not discern the violets that I was looking forward to.

Warburn Estate's 'Bushman's Gully' Cabernet – Shiraz was the Australian representative. On the nose was the spice from Shiraz, and mint from the Cabernet, with plentiful blackberry and jammy red fruits on the palate.

I have left my favourite till last. This was the Portuguese Cape Roca Fish, Vinho Regional Alentejano. Southern Portugal are said to be now producing a new wave of rich, ripe, dry red wines. If this is an example, then many congratulations. Smell that dark fruit and spice. Taste the earthy blackcurrant and black plums. Very yummy.

Fingerfood was supplied by the Club. Did you try the smoked salmon? Pity we can never seem to get enough of the cheeses.

Thanks to Nam Lee Cheong Sdn. Bhd. for providing the wines.

I would remind attendees that 'The Orchid dress code' applies for all functions held in The Orchid. Although a few jackets and batek shirts are available from the Lake Club, they soon run out.





- >> The existing Club's chain-link perimeter fencing with a total length of 450 meters is already more than 30 years old and most parts are badly damaged and pose a risk to the Club's security. The Project Implementation Committee (PIC) is currently in the process of installing a new anti-climb perimeter fencing for the length facing Jalan Parlimen and the Lake Gardens. Parts of the works are shown above.
- >> The PIC is also embarking to renovate the Men's Changing Room. As of the date of printing this Newsletter, the preliminary drawings are already ready for presentation at a Dialogue Session to be tentatively held on Thursday, 6th March at 5.00 pm at the Recreation Hall to receive comments and feedback from Members.
- >> The Main Kitchen has seen about 25 years of active usage. The PIC is also currently looking into refurbishing the Main Kitchen area inclusive of upgrading and replacement of the kitchen equipment as well as all M & E works. The PIC will in due time keep Members abreast of progress of the project which will take place some time in August/September of this year.
- >> In the pipeline, the PIC will be submitting plans to convert the current Gazebo near the Swimming Pool into a multi-usage Gazebo for the common use of the Club's Harriers, the Swimming Section and all other outdoor activities and events organized by the Club. The new Gazebo will also incorporate an upgraded F & B outlet. Works is expected to commence in early 2015.










It has been brought to the Swimming Sub Committee's attention by some Members that the main pool is too "crowded" at certain times of the day, especially during the early mornings and evenings, for swimmers to enjoy lap swimming. To solve this problem, Members are urged to adhere to the following etiquette:



- 1. Swimming direction in the main pool shall be lengthwise only.
- a) Swimmers swim along/directly above the lane line markings which are on the pool bed (Target Lines) as indicated by S1, S2, S3, S4, S5 and S6.
 - b) When all the 6 target lines are occupied, swimmers may swim in between the 2 lane lines, taking care at all times not to 'meander' nor get too close to the lane lines to the left and right of you (as represented by S7, S8, S9, S10, S11, S12 and S13). By exercising care and consideration, our pool can accommodate as many as 13 swimmers at one time and untoward accidents could be avoided.
 - c) Swimmers who are not able to swim 25m continuously are advised to swim on either side of the pool nearest to the walls or may swim as close to the wall as possible, so as not to disrupt other lap swimmers while you rest on the ledges along both sides of the pool.

Circuit swimming may not be practical for our pool. However, if there is a need to implement this in future. The Swimming Sub Committee would study in more detail the best option for all Members. As for now, swimmers are urged to adhere to the above swimming etiquette so that we can enjoy lap swimming comfortably, efficiently and safely.

Greeting the Horse the Hashing Way

Chit Chatting with Heom... by Jon Azman



Chew Sang Heom has been connected in one way or other with the Club since 1941. And he is still with us. This writer had the opportunity to sit down with him as he recalled what this Club was since then. The names of some of the persons mentioned may have been misspelt as Heom could only remember the names as pronounced and is unsure of the spellings. As the Club does not have any record of the personalities mentioned, this writer took the liberty to spell out the names concerned as closely as what he heard. The writer apologises for any error to those living and to those connected with the dead.

It is a long story....



It started off in Hainan, China in the mid 1930s when Heom's doctor grandfather and father were kidnapped by cadres of the communist regime. In their attempt to make a getaway, Heom's grandfather fell, broke a leg and died soon after. Heom's ancestral lineage were well known in the community and during the ensuing manhunt, Heom's father Chew Wai Jin stowed away to Singapore with just the shirt on his back to be followed suit quietly in 1938 by Heom, who was a few years old then, an elder sister and mother.

There was no job for the elder Chew in Singapore and the family of four moved to Kuala Lumpur. Through the help of a distant relative Chew found himself a job in the Lake Club in 1941. His job

was to jaga the Club's old billiards room. Heom remembers the time when the family stayed in one of the two quarters located on what is now the squash courts.

The reprieve from hardship, however, was short lived as by that time the Japanese were already making their way down the Malay Peninsular in search for British 'colonialist'. The Chew family together with the other local Club's staff were huddled to safety by the Club's Committee to a settlement in the jungles around Kajang and Semenyih where the family stayed throughout the war. The senior Chew was enterprising enough and became a door-to-door barber in the settlement. Misfortune struck the family again when Chew was killed by some local Japanese informants who took fancy over the new bicycle which he used to ply his trade. What followed was sufferage as anyone who lived through those circumstances under the Japanese occupation would know.

When the Japanese surrendered in 1945, Heom who was then about 10 years old moved to Ipoh with the family where they stayed till 1951. Those were equally difficult times says Heom, having to depend on the goodwill of relatives for their upkeep. In 1952 during the thick of the Emergency which coincided with the call up for able bodied men to serve in uniform, Heom made his way back to Kuala Lumpur alone. In recognition of his father, the Club employed the young Heom as a dishwasher in the bar section. He was also to clear the 'abok' (read, ashtray). There must have been many pipe smokers then!

Being single, Heom earned a sleeping place on the verandah alongside the old staff quarters in which he used to live with his parents earlier. According to Heom, by the time he started his 'career' at the Club, the *Orang Puteh* Members were already back to re-establish and normalise the Club's operation. As the Club was used by the Japanese as a sort of Headquarters, the physical structure of Club remained undamaged. Nobody knew what took place in the Club then. What Heom knew was that after the resurrection of the Club on December 24, 1945, a certain Mr McCloud volunteered in 1948 to rework on the Club's funds. He operated from an office in Kuala Lumpur town. (Later in life, Mr McCloud was known to have been conferred a Dato' ship by the Sultan of Selangor). In 1952 following Mr McCloud, a Club Member – a certain Mr Toothe took over as Secretary and he was the first Secretary whom Heom served.

Aside from the staff quarters, there were 12 chambers allocated for the Orang Puteh Members. There were lived in by single Members or by Members whose wives had gone back to Britain. Three room boys and one jaga air

oversaw the operation of these chambers. They had to prepare pre-breakfast tea, breakfast, lunch and dinner for these tenant

Members who were mainly employed in the service of the Colonial Government. At that time the Club had another 14 staff – mainly kitchen and bar hands while the few others took care of laundry, the compounds and another the Club jaga. They were a hardworking lot accoding to Heom, what with 300 members to serve. Heom was paid a starting monthly gaji of RM88 payable twice a month and an additional RM5 upon confirmation. Annual increment was fixed at RM2. A large portion of Heom's gaji was sent back to Ipoh to help out with the family – a widowed mother, a sister and one younger brother, Chew Seng Cheng who eventually followed Heom to serve in the Club. Seng Cheng is currently attached with the Club's Machine Room.

The key staff who supervised the workings of the Club during those years was a Chew Seng Guan, a distant relative of Heom. Seng Guan was responsible to issue staff gaji, to oversee stock and purchases and to generally ensure that operations were in order. He reported to a Mrs Harrison, a widow who according to Heom pandai cakap Melayu. Mrs Harrison, who succeeded Mr Toothe was a paid Secretary of the Club. Her office hours were from 10 am to 3 pm. She was assisted by a local typist, a certain Miss Tong who Heom thinks is still alive.

On most nights during the early 1950's of the Club was generally quiet and the premises closed by 9 pm. Children of members must leave by 6 pm. There were, however, many social events throughout any one year. Besides the traditional annual celebrations, there were also gatherings to celebrate St George's Day, St Patrick's Day or for that matter the slightest of excuse was enough to call for a bash. One celebration that Heom particularly remembers clearly was the big do in 1953 to celebrate the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II as the new British Monarch. Generally such Dinner and Dance events were attended by about 150 members and guests. Live music for these occasions were provided by the Police or Army bands and they would play till 2.30 am.

After 2 years being a dishwasher, Heom was promoted to Bar Man, an ability he picked up through observation. Occasionally he was taught the finer art of mixing by the older staff of by Members themselves. In 1955, a Mrs Parkston, the wife of an army Colonel took over as Secretary of the Club. She was followed by a Mrs Nichols who lasted for 6 months before leaving for Australia. Mrs Nichols was succeeded by a Mrs Grieves whose husband was an Estate Manage in what is now Petaling Jaya. Incidentally, Mrs Grieves visited the Club a few years ago. A Major Holden who had a Malay wife became the next Secretary for 2 years. He was followed by retired Navy Commander Fenning who served for over a year.

Heom could not recall the actual dates of services of these foregoing Secretaries of the Club. In any event, sometimes in the mid 1960s Commander Fenning was succeeded by Andrew Blaney, a bachelor planter who stayed on for the next 8 years which enabled him to serve under the Club's first Malaysian President, YM Tunku Tan Sri Mohamed Bin Tunku Besar Burhanudin and a part of our late second Prime Minister Tun Abdul Razak's tenure as the second Malaysian President of the Club. Andrew Blaney was subsequently conferred to Dato'ship by the Sultan of Kelantan then.

It was during the tenure of Andrew Blaney that the Staff Union came into being. Things became better said Heom. With an increased monthly gaji then of RM175, Heom could finally afford to get married. He moved out of the Club's premises and rented a house together with his younger brother in what is now OUG Gardens.

As most Senior Members of the Club would know, the late Jack Smith took over from Andrew Blaney in 1972 having been recruited from the Sungei Ujong Club, Seremban by the late Tun. Under General Manager/Secretary Jack Smith, the old chambers and staff quarters had to be demolished to make way for the Club's expansion. Activities in the Club had increased to include additional spaces for tennis, lawn bowling and squash. Membership of the Club increased significantly during the tenure of the late Tun. The Club brought together Royalties, Cabinet Ministers, Senior Government Officers, Corporate figures, professionals and members of the diplomatic fraternity. At the peak, the staff count increased to 237 according to Heom as opposed to a staff strength of 38 during the pre-60s.

By early 1970's, Heom was already a Captain in the old Orchid Room for which he has fond memories. The concept of the Orchid Room was first mooted and realised in 1958 by a Mr Ashley, an architect by profession who subsequently became the Club's President in 1962. The late 1950s and the ensuing 1960s were interesting times. With more Malaysians gradually becoming Members, the Club became a Who's Who meeting place. With the

completion of the Parliament House, the Club went through a phase of improvements to befit its stature being a breathing distance away from the centre of power. According to Heom, the Sultan of Selangor then, our current Yang di-Pertuan Agong and the late Finance Minister Tun Sir Henry H S Lee foresaw that the Club by its history and location would play a prominent role as a place where the cream of the Nation could informally meet. They were supportive of the Club's development.

What featured most at the Club during those days was the culinary delights of the Orchid Room. By popular requests the Club became the catering base for western cuisine for the Parliament House. A red card was specially issued to the Club for unfettered entry into the Parliament grounds. The newly established Orchid Room became the country's No 1 dining and dancing outlet which according to Heom was fully packed day and night.

It was not uncommon for our first Yang di-Pertuan Agong, the Yang di-Pertuan Besar of Negri Sembilan to patronize the Orchid Room sometimes with a retinue of 40 others to enjoy the Orchid Room's flagship 'Steak Aladdin'. According to Heom, this was steak wrapped around with a specially baked soft and sweetish bread. The Palace of the Sultan of Selangor which is located beyond the National Monuments nearby was also another 'client' of the Club. The late Tun Razak and family were not only regular diners at the outlet, the Orchid Room also had the distinction to cater for state functions held in the Prime Minister's residence, now the Tun Razak Memorial nearby. A number of Ministries and Government Departments also placed their orders with the Club. The Western cuisine Chef who was behind all these gastronomic delight was the Club's in-house caterer then, a Lim Jit Tuan who was subsequently succeeded by the current operator of the Club's Main Kitchen, Chee and his son Edward.

By 1978, after being No 1 Captain of the Orchid Room and Banquet Hall for 7 years, Heom was promoted to Club Steward which strictly speaking has no equivalent title in the Club today.

Upon reaching 55 in the early 1990, Heom retired, but not for long. Within a few months he was reemployed by Edric Caterers of Chee and Edward. Although not directly placed under the Club's payroll, Heom remains very much a part of the Club; fondly referred to as 'Uncle' by all the present staff. Not only that, many second generation Club members, a number of whom have today become prominent figures, still hold Heom with humble reverence.

Heom used to look after some of them when they were toddlers and some had even been given a ticking for being mischievous.

When asked how the Club has changed, Heom feels that the Club in the old building was a happier place, The Orchid Room, the Banquet Hall, the Buttery and the Batek Bar being contiguous to each other fostered closeness amongst members. Occasional Hoo-Ha could not go unnoticed. Members were then less conscious of their stature in life and loud complaints were frowned upon. Unlike all the letter writing-ins of complaints which is the practice today, there used to be a General Complaints book for members to write-in their grouses and the Secretary would accordingly respond promptly in the next column for all Membership to see. Secretaries of the Club then by their sheer presence and facial expression, without a word being spoken, were enough to ensure that Members toe the lines established by the Club. It was reminiscent of the old Regimental Sargeant Major who could command a higher officer to shape up.

And of course Heom had many juicy tales to tell..... but that is another story. What has captured is meat enough for current Membership to value what this Club had been all about.

Thank you Heom and the Club wishes you many more healthy years.




Figure 1 Maki Kaji, Puzzle 91 Hard (Nikoli, Japan) LS(167), B1, then 5 in R1C2; then 2 in R1C7, R1, OD




Figure 2 R3 with missing (358): 5 in R3C7 by OD, a key find. Getting LT(9) in B4 is a key find also.















OBITUARY



In life, as in death, Dr T Thurairatnam was "a befriender" par excellence who through sheer force of his jovial personality, made every Member of the Royal Lake Club his personal friend. Between the ages of 21 & before the 25th birthday

A member's child who is above 21 but below 25 years of age, single and a full-time student, is eligible for membership if the member has been a voting member of the Club for five (5) years or more and has used the club facilities for at least five (5) continuous years as a Resident member before the child attains the age of 21 and such a parent voting member is the proposer to the child's application

a) Study within Malaysia

The application is received by the Club within six (6) months from the date of award of certificate/diploma/ degree or on or before the applicant's 25th birthday, whichever is the earlier.

b) Study outside Malaysia

The application is received by the Club within six (6) months from the date of return to Malaysia or on or before the applicant's 25th birthday, whichever is the earlier.
