TRIP TO GARDENIA BAKERIES

A wonderful whiff of freshly baked bread welcomed us as we entered Gardenia Bakeries factory on the morning of 7 October 2017. It must be noted that this planned visit was so well-received that registration closed more than a month before it materialised.

We were met upon arrival by one Miss Ais whose cheerful disposition brightened the morning up considerably. She led the group to the auditorium for a light-hearted documentary done in humorous animation, which traced the evolution of bread-making from the olden days to present time.

From the auditorium we moved to the viewing area to observe the entire process of bread and bun making. We were also shown how the products were packaged.

Gardenia Bakeries commenced operations in 1986. I had the privileged of visiting the factory that year, where I witnessed how the dough were manually “manicured” and put into the oven one by one to be baked. The factory back then was just a shed.

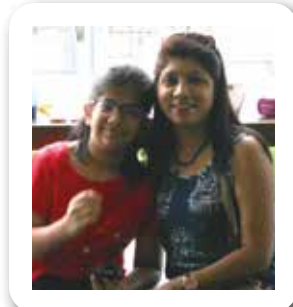
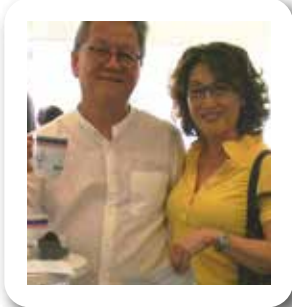
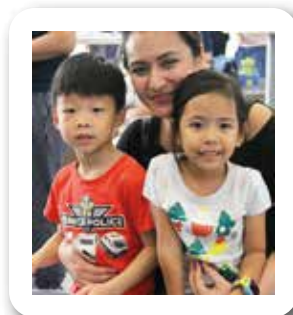
Today Gardenia Bakeries has 5 modern state-of-the-art factories. The factory that we visited can make 8,000 loaves of

bread per hour and it runs round the clock. Most of the tasks then done manually are now performed by machines and/or robots and each factory has just about 100 staff, many of whom involved in quality control work.

After viewing it was time for sampling. We were served with muffins and bread and a lucky few who managed to answer questions correctly were rewarded with waffles and pizza buns. These are just four of the 41 products manufactured by Gardenia Bakeries.

Soon enough it was time to go. Upon leaving, each of us received a goodie bag filled with bread, waffles, pizza buns and a special spread. Also included were slices of Gardenia’s latest Wholegrain bread made from 100% Canadian Purple Wheat wholegrain. Reputedly, the bread has high anti-oxidant properties, high fibre and with 0% of trans-fat.

There were more quizzes, this time compliment of Mrs. Soong. Prizes were given on the coach enroute home to all 3 categories of entries, little children, bigger children and adults. All things considered, it was indeed an educational outing for both children and adults.

The following statistics supports why it is important to learn CPR:

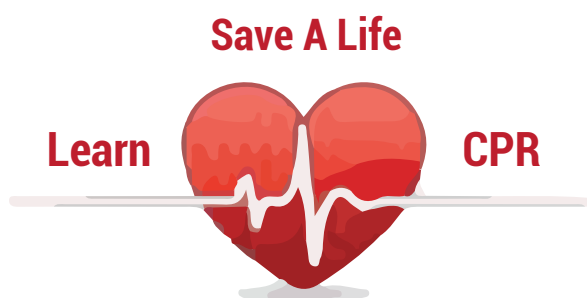
- Drowning is the leading cause of accidental death for children ages one to four.
- One minute is all it takes for a child to drown.
- Eighty-eight percent of cardiac arrests happen in the home.
- Less than 6.4% of cardiac arrest victims survive because people witnessing the incident do not know CPR.
- In the US, over 200,000 people die of sudden cardiac arrests every year. A quarter of this total number could be prevented.



People feel helpless to act during a cardiac emergency because either they do not know how to administer CPR, or their training has significantly lapsed. Since a high percentage of cardiac arrests happen in the home, it is very likely that the life you save with CPR is the life of a loved one.

Effective bystander CPR provided immediately after sudden cardiac arrest can double or triple a victim's chance of survival. In America, where learning of CPR is greatly encouraged, less than 32 percent of cardiac arrest victims get CPR from a bystander, what more in our country.

Sadly, less than 8% of people who suffer cardiac arrest outside the hospital survive. CPR is an important skill to have. You can use it to save a life. Consider getting some training!



Why Learn?

- CPR is an important skill.
- By performing simple procedures and following certain guidelines, it may be possible to save lives by giving basic treatment until professional medical help arrives.
- Remember, too, that practice makes perfect.
- In an emergency there's no time to read instructions. If you've memorized some of the basic procedures, it will help you react quickly and efficiently.
- Can make the difference from complete recovery and permanent disability
- Can help you save a life

What Else Should We Know?

Knowledge of First Aid too is extremely important. Learning CPR and First Aid may be one of the best things we ever do.

It is also extremely important to know what we can do to prevent drowning. **Knowing preventative measures before we go swimming** can save the lives of the people we care about most. If we have any children, we should make sure that they take a **swimming assessment**. This will help us determine what we need to do to make sure our child doesn't drown. Knowing and following **safety tips** will ensure that we can prevent drowning!

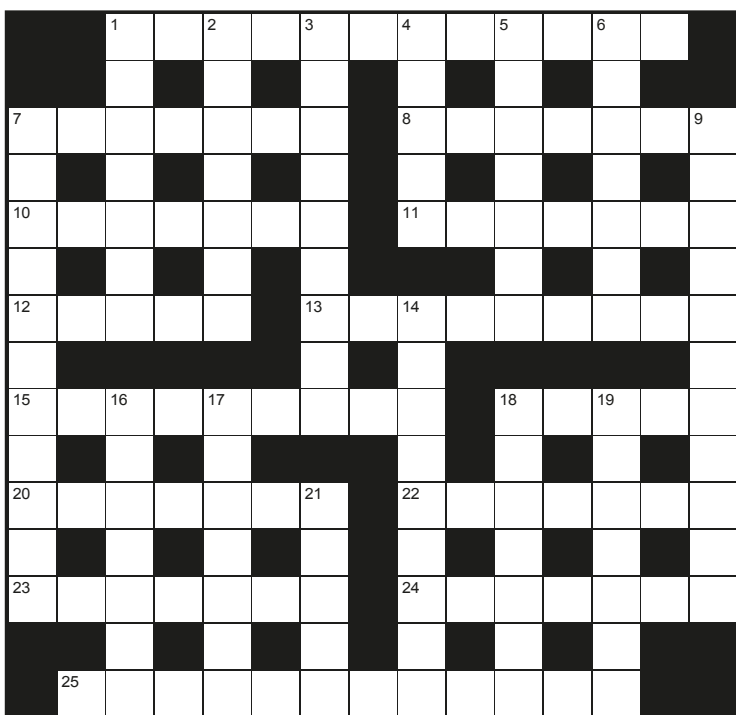

SUDOKU CHALLENGE

Results/Worked Example of Sudoku Challenge: September/October 2017 Issue.

Maki Kaji "Difficult Sudoku" (Nikoli, Japan) Adapted No. 100 HARD; 22 clues; 59 digit solutions. Solving process is based on a systematic/structured methodology involving analyzing in the 3 bands/3 stacks (tools: analysis of R, C, B, using missing digits; techniques: by only-cell (OC) or only-digit (OD) logic. *Only OD logic used is stated.* The methodology consists of **initial digit analysis (IDA)** using only initial digits and **follow-up analysis (FUA)**. Every initial solution/initial locked set (LS) is followed up until no more follow-up solution can be deduced. F. up analysis of a soln. takes place in its **territory (OT)** and **extended territory (ET)**. When no direct soln. can be deduced, **strategic locked set** is deduced to enable the next solution to be deduced logically; otherwise, "what-if" reasoning (trial-and-error way) is used. The process creates chains of solutions containing main chain and branched-out mini-chains originating from each initial soln./initial LS set deduced from IDA. The final chain of solns. contains the final soln., thus solving the Sudoku.

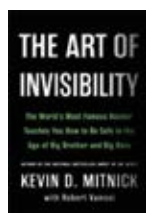

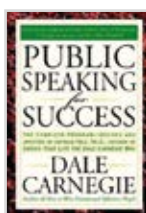

What begins as a case of literary curiosity turns into a race to find out the truth behind the life and death of Julian Carax and to save those he left behind. A page-turning exploration of obsession in literature and love, and the places that obsession can lead.



Finders Keepers by Stephen King

'Wake up, genius.' So begins King's instantly riveting story about a vengeful reader. The genius is John Rothstein, a Salinger-like icon who created a famous character, Jimmy Gold, but who hasn't published a book for decades. Morris Bellamy is livid, not just because Rothstein has stopped providing books, but because the nonconformist Jimmy Gold has sold out

for a career in advertising.

Morris kills Rothstein and empties his safe of cash, yes, but the real treasure is a trove of notebooks containing at least one more Gold novel. Morris hides the money and the notebooks, and then he is locked away for another crime. Decades later, a boy named Pete Saubers finds the treasure, and now it is Pete and his family that Bill Hodges, Holly Gibney, and Jerome Robinson must rescue from the ever-more deranged and vengeful Morris when he's released from prison after thirty-five years.

Not since *Misery* has King played with the notion of a reader whose obsession with a writer gets dangerous. Finders Keepers is spectacular, heart-pounding suspense, but it is also King writing about how literature shapes a life - for good, for bad, forever.



The Dog Whisperer: the essential guide to understanding and raising a happy dog by John Richardson and Leslye Sharon Cole

This essential guide to training your canine companion will help you to understand your dog's behaviour and thinking. Based on the premise that the modern dog shares many of the behavioural characteristics of its ancestor, the wolf, this book will

show you the ten keys to effective training and how to put the theory into practice. Dogs respond to training and will quickly understand the principles of reward, reinforcement and reprimand if carried out effectively and consistently. The Dog Whisperer explains how to train your dog's behaviour, learn to solve problems effectively, and offers a revealing insight into the mind of your dog, which will ultimately lead to a positive relationship between you and your canine friend.

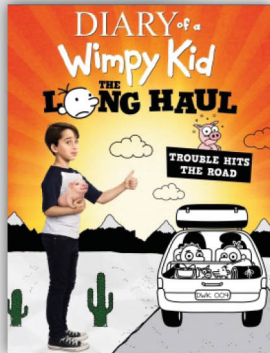
